Kris Iltis' "A Troubling of Koi" on display

Artists on Santa Fe at 747 Santa Fe Drive will showcase work by gallery member Kris Iltis through Aug. 31. Typically known for her oil painting, this show will instead highlight her unique approach to ceramics and gel-plate mono-prints in an exhibition entitled "A Troubling of Koi". A group of koi fish is curiously referred to as a "troubling" - along the lines of a "murder of crows" or "pride of lions" — and feature prominently as a theme throughout this collection.

The public is invited to an artist reception from 6 to 8 p.m. Aug. 16.

Having grown up in Japan, Iltis' ceramic work combines influences from her childhood including the iconic Japanese koi, but with a rough, organic aesthetic. Hanging platters, uneven bowls, slumped, cracked and bubbled, all featuring images of koi, celebrate a unique imperfection. Her prints on paper use businesses.

a silicone gel plate. She hand cuts stencils and applies acrylic inks in layers. Vibrant, textural designs evoke themes of movement and the interplay between light and shadow. Koi shapes move about the surface, some under a bright moon, others in undulating waters.

The collection celebrates a fusion of cultures, and exploration of mediums and the experience of leaving the final result to chance.

Artists on Santa Fe Gallery showcases the work of member artists. Regular hours are 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays, and noon to 4 p.m. Sundays. 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How Low Will Rates Go, and What Will Be the Impact on Buyers and Sellers?

The Federal Reserve was created by the United States Congress in 1913 with the mandate to provide the nation with a safer, more flexible, and stable monetary system. It is often referred to as the central bank of the United States. The interest rate set by the "Fed" dictates how much banks receive or pay each other in interest to borrow or lend funds to each other overnight.

There is no direct correlation between the "Fed Funds" rate and mortgage interest rates. Mortgage rates typically track the "yield" on 10year treasury bonds. Forecasts by mortgage giants FNMA, FHLMC and GNMA suggest that if we see market rates below 6%, it is not likely to occur until 2025. While we might see

> on a \$650,000 purchase price from 6.41% to 5.5% is approximately \$10,075 as of Aug. 11.

"Buydowns" can be paid for by the borrower or by the seller on behalf of the borrower. The cost of the buydown in the above example would be recouped in approximately 33 months. For purchasers who expect to own their new home for 5 to 10 years, it can make sense to consider purchasing an even lower interest rate.

Sellers who have been unwilling to part with their enviable 2.75% to 4% mortgages might want to consider using a portion of their strong equity positions to buy down the rate on their next home and/or convert their current home into an investment property, allowing them to keep their valuable low rate.

A balanced market is frankly a gift to both buyers and sellers. If rates continue to fall, demand will build, and buyers will, once again, find themselves competing with multiple offers.
